<u>December 2023 Preservation Report</u> <u>by Brian Conroy</u>

As the Christmas season is upon us, the gift of battlefield preservation is always a wonderful way to end the year. This month, we will look at two of the bloodiest battles that happened during the Civil War, both of which happened in the Western Theater. The 184 acres of hallowed ground in Tennessee being looked at to be preserved have \$8 million in anticipated grants and gifts, after the \$421,000 that is needed to be raised by the American Battlefield Trust with a 20-to-1 match.

The first parcel looked at is 152 acres at **Shiloh**, where the battle allowed Union troops to penetrate the Confederate interior. After Confederate forces overran the Union camp, Confederate General Albert Sidney Johnston was alerted to the presence of a Union force that lay poised to attack his right flank, when in actuality it was General Ulysses S. Grant's Army of the Tennessee that was positioned on his left front. Colonel David Stuart's three infantry regiments were camped at this location, and during a series of tactical maneuvers, his position was bombarded heavily and his men engaged in fierce fighting as they were pushed back for many hours. While the situation may have seemed hopeless to Stuart and his men, Confederate advancement became stalled and impeded by the arrival of Union General John McArthur's brigade, which occupied a steep ridge line north and west of Stuart. And by the afternoon of the next day, a portion of the defeated Confederate army retreated.

The acquisition of this unprotected tract inside Shiloh's legislated battlefield park boundary, after nearly a century, would again permit public access to this hallowed land. Visitors could appreciate and understand the events that transpired at Shiloh.

The second piece of land to be preserved this month is 32 acres at the **Battle of Stones River**. At dawn on December 31, 1862, the division of Confederate General John McCown struck the right flank of the Army of the Cumberland just south of the tract to be saved today. McCown's movements threatened to create a gap in the Confederate line, forcing General Patrick Cleburne to commit his brigades much earlier than anticipated. On December 31, 1862, Confederate Generals Lucius E. Polk and Bushrod Johnson collided with Colonel Sidney Post's Union brigade on this tract. These forces fiercely struggled on this ground for nearly a half hour until Post's men finally broke and retreated, with the high cost reported by General Bushrod Johnson as "More than half of the whole loss of this brigade, in my opinion, occurred in this conflict."

The battle raged through New Year's Day. Ultimately, the bloody Union victory set the stage for campaigns into the heart of the Confederacy while providing a much-needed northern morale boost and support for the Emancipation Proclamation.

The land was recently listed for sale as prime commercial property, and the surrounding area is overrun with commercial, industrial, and residential development.
