TOPIC: "Lincoln on Slavery, Emancipation And Equality"

SPEAKER: Kevin Wood (aka Mr. Lincoln)

Mr. Lincoln shares his ever-evolving perspectives on the subjects of slavery, emancipation, and equality, including the relationship between the white and black races during his times. He gives a brief summary of the long history of slavery in North America, focusing especially on the great debates and compromises over slavery at the time of the formation of the United States and during the subsequent 80 years. He discusses his own political views on slavery and emancipation and how these gradually shifted over the years. He talks about his interactions with both free and enslaved blacks, and about the relationship in general between the white and black races in his times. And, of course, he discusses the great events of his presidency as related to these issues, including the significant decisions to issue the Emancipation Proclamation, to allow blacks to join the armed forces, to give up on the idea of colonizing blacks elsewhere, and to advocate for black suffrage.

Mr. Lincoln is portrayed by Kevin Wood, a professional Lincoln presenter who bears a remarkable resemblance to "the Great Emancipator" and who is extremely knowledgeable about his life and times. Mr. Wood has been portraying Mr. Lincoln since the year 2000, and on a professional basis since 2015. He has made over 1,300 appearances in 31 states plus Washington DC and two foreign countries: Canada and Spain. Mr. Wood also writes a blog – "Loath to Close... MAY MEETING UPDATE by Art Foley

As a student of history I've always been on the search to make connections. I welcome assistance to guide my attempts to grasp the thought process of the individuals we encounter.

Dan Van Haften's presentation for the May Zoom session, "The Tyranny of Public Discourse: Abraham Lincoln's Six Element Antidote for Meaningful and Persuasive Writing," offered an outline, (fleshed out in the Dan's text of the same name), that can provide a method for the development of a orderly, concise, and logical system of written communication. Based on the method of discourse set out in the process Euclidean geometric discovery, our sixteenth President applied that process to prose composition.

Dan provided instances from Lincoln's correspondence starting during 1855 and onwards for instruction and clarification. Letter's to members of the Illinois legal / political members, instruction to military commanders, (David Hunter, Joseph Hooker, George Meade), and public communication, (2nd Inaugural), served to illustrate Lincoln's methodology. The Presidents' ability to use location, timing, and verbal logic enabled an effective transference of message. The structure underlying his words forming the story beautifully paints his persuasive ability.

To delve into greater description in this recapitulation would poorly serve the subject - I recommend if you desire to incorporate this style that you purchase the text. I have and have found it to be very helpful.

JUNE 2021 PRESERVATION REPORT By Brian Conroy

Welcome to the end of our meeting season, and the beginning of summer. We are finishing the series of our preservation focusing on the rise of the modern preservation movement based on an article about Battlefield Preservation by Bob Zeller, who is co-founder and President for the Center for Civil War Photography.

In 1997, a new phase in battlefield preservation started by reclaiming developed land, removing modern structures, and returning the land to the way it looked during the Civil War. This began with the purchase of a single-family home and lot that was established as the site of the Carter Cotton Gin at the epicenter of the furious battle at Franklin on Nov. 30, 1864 that was forgotten by the 1990s. Organizations such as the American Battlefield Protection Program soon purchased more properties and spearheading certain innovative approaches to reclaiming land and its history from development in other places outside of Franklin, such as at Gettysburg and Antietam.

The Civil War Trust has also embarked on daunting propositions of purchasing highly marketable and desirable land before it is developed, such as the 247 acres of the Slaughter Pen Farm in Fredericksburg in 2006 for \$12 million, in partnership with Tricord, Inc. development company, the American Battlefield Protection Program, SunTrust Bank, and the Central Virginia Battlefield Trust to buy and preserve the largest remaining unprotected part of the Fredericksburg battlefield, and the scene of a Union assault and a furious battle that rivaled the simultaneous charge at Marye's Heights. Developments that have been recently thwarted were against a casino next to the Gettysburg battlefield in 2005-06 and 2010-11, and in 2009-2011 a Walmart superstore on historic land next to the Wilderness battlefield. In May 2002, 790 acres in the heart of the Chancellorsville battlefield were saves from housing and commercial space after a 10-month campaign, after which the Trust acquired two parcels totaling 214 acres in 2010 and 2013.

Civil War battlefield development is rife with victories and losses of preservation battles, such as Tipton Park on Little Round Top, leading to the greatest progress in battlefield preservation not won in the courts, but achieved by private citizens alarmed by rampant battlefield development. Seeing a need to preserve these historic sites, they gathered together to form grass roots organizations to save battlefields by buying them. The movement grew beyond the founders' greatest expectation as today's American Battlefield Trust announced in 2018 that more than 50,000 battlefield acres at more than 130 different battlefields in 26 states had been exceeded, with more in the works and many more planned for the future.
