TOPIC: "The Battle of Monocacy"

SPEAKER: Charles Banks

In July of 1864, a hodge-podge of Union troops was quickly assembled under the command of Major General Lew Wallace for a defense along the banks of the Monocacy River just outside Frederick, Maryland. Facing that Union defense was a veteran Confederate force under Lt. General Jubal Early who left the Army of Northern Virginia a month before and moved down the Shenandoah Valley, crossed the Potomac River, and moved into Maryland. Mr. Bank's talk will study the Battle of Monocacy and show how Lew Wallace's makeshift force just might have saved Washington, D.C.

Charlie Banks has been a longtime active member of the Civil War Round Table movement. He is past president of the Northern Illinois CWRT, Lake County CWRT, and McHenry County CWRT. The Salt Creek CWRT extends a hearty welcome to Mr. Banks and looks forward to his insight of this important battle.

FEBRUARY MONTHLY MEETING REPORT

At the February meeting longtime member Art Foley enlightened the membership about an unsung hero of Gettysburg in his presentation "Henry Hunt and the Third Day at Gettysburg". Henry Hunt was from a military family. His father was an infantry officer and his grandfather was a colonel in the Revolutionary War. He graduated from West Point in 1839 as a brevet 2nd Lt. in the 2nd U.S Artillery serving under Winfield Scott in the Mexican War. In 1857 he served in the U.S. Artillery in the Mormon War in Utah.

Hunt was a member of a three-man board that revised the field artillery drill and tactic for the army. After Bull Run, Hunt joined McClellan's staff where he organized and trained the army artillery reserve of the Army of the Potomac and fought in the Peninsula Campaign. Before the Battle of Chancellorsville Hunt fell out of favor with General Joseph Hooker and lost direct command of the Artillery Reserve. The lack of coordination of the artillery forces was recognized and Hooker restored his command after the battle.

Hunt's greatest service was at the Battle of Gettysburg. He was a proponent of artillery practices that reflected conservation of ammunition. He urged gun crews to fire slowly with more accuracy. His handling of the artillery helped in the repulse of Pickett's charge. Hunt resisted the command pressure from General Hancock to keep firing and using up ammunition before it could be replenished. Hunt order his crews to gradually cease fire, thus fooling the confederates into thinking his batteries were destroyed or out of ammunition. His placement of batteries north of Little Round Top caused massive casualties along with the remaining ammunition that was fired after the assault began. After Gettysburg Hunt served the rest of the war in Virginia, managing the siege of Petersburg. His courage and tactics affected the outcome of some of the most significant battles of the Civil War.


