The Battle of Antietam, widely known at the bloodiest day in American history, was also a pivotal point in the Civil War. The battle itself was a draw, but it ended Robert E. Lee's first attempt at invading the North. The outcome of the battle caused President Lincoln to reevaluate the performance of General George McClellan, a decision that altered the outcome of the war. Author David Keller provides a fresh look at the command decisions of Lee and McClellan before, during and after the Battle of Antietam, with insight into President Lincoln's evaluation of McClellan and his use of the Battle of Antietam for political purposes.

David Keller is a long time resident of Chicago and an amateur historian. Retired from the business community since 2002, he devotes much of his time to volunteer activities including the Chicago History Museum. He is founder and managing director of the Camp Douglas Restoration Foundation and editor of its newsletter, Camp Douglas News. Mr. Keller's books include: The Story of Camp Douglas: Chicago's Forgotten Civil War Prison, Military Prisons of the American Civil War, Robert Anderson Bagby: Civil War Diary 1863-1865 and Command at Antietam-Lincoln, McClellan and Lee.

November 2021 Preservation Report

As we continue through fall and another season of great Civil War discussions and presentations, we are also continuing with our four-part series on preservation efforts that will cover the course of a little more than two years and five battles across three states in the Western Theater that changed the course, and ultimately, the outcome of the American Civil War. These tracts of land, which there is an opportunity to save, was fought fiercely over by both Union and Confederate forces, and controlled the means of transportation in the south on the river and by railroad. The donation match is \$9.27-\$1, and the ultimate goal is \$307,450.

The third part of our series covers the incredibly vital port of Port Hudson on the Mississippi River. This historic, 2.6-acre tract was well within the Confederate defenses, and were impacted heavily by an almost nonstop bombardment of Union artillery. Located 20 miles south of Baton Rouge, Port Hudson State Historic Site preserves the site of the 1863 Union siege of the Confederate stronghold along the river bluffs. Adding to its historic nature are a portion of the post-siege earthworks constructed by the Corps d'Afrique, a unit that later became part of the United States Colored Troops.

Beginning on May 11th, 1863, as Maj. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's launched his final offensive against Vicksburg, Maj. General Nathaniel P. Banks moved his forces against Port Hudson after learning that some Confederates had been moved from Port Hudson to support the forces defending Vicksburg. Banks divided his forces into two columns: one group of three divisions approaching Port Hudson from Alexandria to the north, and a second column of two divisions advancing north from Baton Rouge. By May 21st, the columns had combined and Banks' force of about 30,000 men surrounded the Port Hudson defenders and outnumbered them four to one. Banks delayed nearly a week organizing his forces, giving Maj. Gen. Franklin Gardner, in command of the Confederate defenders, time to reinforce his lines and move additional artillery into place.

Banks, supported by U.S. Navy gunships, finally attacked on May 27th in a series of uncoordinated and unsuccessful attacks. Another Union attack on June 13th was beaten back, so Banks settled in for a siege. Soon the defenders exhausted their food and ammunition, and fighting and disease greatly reduced the number of men able to defend the trenches. A Confederate soldier wrote of their food supplies during their 48 days under siege, one of the longest in American military history: "We eat all the meat and bread in the fort...eat all the beef-all the mules--all the Dogs--and all the Rats around us."

When Gardner learned that Vicksburg had surrendered on July 4th, he realized that his situation was hopeless and surrendered on July 9th, thus opening the Mississippi River to allow unobstructed Union navigation from its source to New Orleans.
