TOPIC: "Lincoln on Immigration and America's Place in the World"

SPEAKER: Kevin Wood (aka Mr. Lincoln)

Mr. Lincoln discusses the history of immigration in our country, focusing especially on the years from 1830 to 1860 when the rate of immigration increased dramatically and immigration groups became more diverse. He also discusses the responses to this shift in immigration, including the rise of nativism and attempts to limit the influence of new immigrants. He discusses his own experiences with immigrants and their place in America. He ties this in with the related issues of world events and international relations, especially with respect to Europe and Latin America. And he shows how the American Civil War was important not only to the cause of liberty in our own nation, but also to the future of republican/democratic movements in other parts of the world.

Mr. Lincoln is portrayed by Kevin Wood, a professional Lincoln presenter who bears a remarkable resemblance to "the Great Emancipator" and who is extremely knowledgeable about his life and times. Mr. Wood also writes a blog –"Loath to Close... Still!" – which encourages others to reflect upon and learn form President Lincoln's life and legacy.

SEPTEMBER MEETING UPDATE by Art Foley

Joseph Medill and his male siblings Civil War experiences were recounted at our September meeting by Georgianna Baldino. Her presentation "A Family and Nation Under Fire" based on her text of the same name, told the story of Joseph Medill and his brother William.

Joseph Medill, the oldest child in the family, was one of the founders of the Republican Party and through his several newspaper holdings exerted influence on the party's activities during the 1850's onward. Medill used his influence in assisting in the nomination and election campaign of his fellow Republican, Abraham Lincoln. He would also continue as an advisor, (whether asked or not) to Lincoln throughout the war.

James, William and Samuel, were the other male siblings of Joseph. All of the brothers participated in the newspapers owned by their family and like their oldest sibling were involved in many of the liberal and patriotic causes of the day.

Brothers James and Samuel, inherited from their father, an affliction to rheumatism and other ailments. Their physical difficulties limited them in their desired military pursuits and brought about the early demise of James in 1864, and Samuel, shortly after the war.

The fourth brother, William, enlisted in a ninety day unit and then was a participant in the recruitment of a company in the Eighth Illinois Cavalry. He would ultimately rise to the rank of Major, well respected by his peers. William and Joseph's letters provided accounts of not only military events that occurred in the eastern theater for the period of 1861 - 1863, but of the political theater as experienced by Joseph. News from the home-front came from the mailings of other family members as well.

Letters from the front, documented camp life, army scuttlebutt, and the actions involving William. He participated in campaigns in western Virginia, the Penninsula, Antietam, Fredericksburg, and Chancellorsville. The final entries are concerned with the Gettysburg campaign. Unfortunately, during the post-battle pursuit of rebel army, William sustained a mortal wound at Williamsport. He lingered and died on July 18, in the company of Joseph who had rushed to his side.

Mrs. Baldino's examination of these family experiences have been a welcomed September opener. Huzzah!
