SPEAKER: Robert Girardi

Robert Girardi will be speaking about Chicago and its relationship with the Civil War. This presentation will be about the Windy City's portrayal of the Civil War in its public art, parks, and cemeteries and how the memory and significance of these events has changed over time.

Robert I. Girardi has a Masters Degree in Public History from Loyola University. A lifelong student of the American Civil War, he has studied all aspects of the conflict. He is a past president of the Chicago CWRT and is the author or editor of nine books, numerous articles and book reviews. He was a board member of the Illinois State Historical Society and was guest editor for the 2011-2014 Sesquicentennial of the Civil War issues of the *Journal of the Illinois State Historical Society*. His most recent article, "Reconsidering Major General Gouverneur K. Warren," appeared in the July 2020 issue of North & South Magazine. He is currently working on a military biography of Warren.

October 2021 Preservation Report

As we continue through fall and another season of great Civil War discussions and presentations, we are also continuing with our four part series on preservation efforts that will cover the course of a little more than two years and five battles across three states in the Western Theater that changed the course, and ultimately, the outcome of the American Civil War. These tracts of land, which there is an opportunity to save, was fought fiercely over by both Union and Confederate forces, and controlled the means of transportation in the south on the river and by railroad. The donation match is \$9.27-\$1, and the ultimate goal is \$307, 450.

The second part of our series will cover a 144-acre tract that is at the heart of the Battle of Champion Hill, and was secured through generous support to meet a fundraising goal for a conservation easement to prevent future development as future descendants retain ownership of the family land that they have farmed for five generations. The Champion family, who have faithfully protected their ancestral lands since the fighting took place a century and a half ago, agreed to let the Battlefield Trust acquire a large parcel of land measuring 393.7 acres at the northern portion of the battlefield. Saving the Champions' land from commercial development or new housing projects is what is best for this tract so this important chapter of our nation's history can be available to future generations.

On May 16, 1863, General Grant's army was marching unchecked through Mississippi following their capture of Jackson, Mississippi. Confederate General John C. Pemberton left the Vicksburg defenses, meeting federal forces in a fierce struggle halfway between Jackson and Vicksburg, the hopes of preventing the Federals from severing the railroads that fed the fortress city. The two armies met that day in a ferocious firefight that raged primarily over a 3-mile line of covered roads on high ground owned by Sid and Matilda Champion. In the ensuing struggle, Pemberton stretched his line to meet the Federal troops that were bent on outflanking him, Union brigades were nearly swept away by a counterattack led by the division of Brig. Gen. John Bowen, and Bowen's men were driven off as Grant ordered men towards the hill, compelling a retreat of Confederate troops.

This victory, along with another at Big Black River the following day, forced Pemberton's Confederates into a doomed position inside the walled fortifications of Vicksburg, thus setting the stage for the siege that ended with the city's capitulation on July 4, 1863.

All told, these four decisive battles in this series, contributed to victory after victory for Union forces, and the capture and control of strategic locations where railroad lines were and the Mississippi River flowed, contributed to the eventual conclusion of the American Civil War.
