TOPIC: "Sherman's March to the Sea: War Crime or Military Necessity?"

SPEAKER: Bruce Allardice

Many Southerners, at the time and later, labeled William T. Sherman's "March to the Sea" as a "war crime", with Sherman singled out as the Civil War's criminal. Certainly General Sherman was the war's prime exponent of "hard war", a war in which civilian lives and property were targeted in the hopes that would break southern morale and infrastructure. Sherman's own "Make Georgia Howl" rhetoric fueled this image. But is the image correct? Did Sherman's army violate any recognized usage of war at the time, or was its often destructive path marked out by out-of-the-ordinary atrocities? Professor Allardice reviews the facts of the March, and considers how the "March" has been treated in history.

A professor of history at South Suburban College, Bruce S. Allardice is the past president of both the Civil War Round Table of Chicago and the Northern Illinois CWRT. Prof. Allardice has authored or coauthored six books, and numerous articles on the Civil War. A former Board Member of the Illinois State Historical Society, Prof. Allardice has presented numerous lectures and presentation on the Civil War and genealogy for Civil War Round Tables, museums, and civic organizations. He is also the recipient of the CWRT of Chicago's prestigious Nevins-Freeman Award for distinguished service in Civil War Scholarship and the CWRT movement. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois School of Law.

SEPTEMBER MONTHLY SUMMARY BY ARTHUR FOLEY

Frank Crawford, our September speaker, shared the narrative of the Andersonville prison. In existence from early 1864 until its liberation in May 1865, the prison held approximately 45,000 prisoners of which 13,000 died. Also known as Camp Sumter, the camp left inmates exposed to the elements, complete lack of sanitation, and a water supply, Stockade Creek and Providence Spring, that was inadequate to the demand. All of the supply shortage issues plaguing the Confederacy were combined and heightened at the prison making it a hell on earth.

Captain Henry Wirz, the Swiss born commander of the prisoners attempted to contact the Federal government to restart the exchange system through a prisoner petition, carried by five prisoner to Washington to no avail. In later 1864 prisoners were moved east to various other locations for a period until Sherman's March necessitated their return. With a lack of rules pertaining to protection of prisoners, a primitive civilization arose in the camp. Groups of criminals banded together to rob, intimidate, and murder their fellows. These "Raiders" ultimately were overpowered by just men, "Regulators", tried ,(with Wirz's approval), and punished. Six prisoners were executed. Their graves lay apart from the mass group of graves and do not receive any honors.
