Major General James Blair Steedman (pronounced Stead-men), a former newspaperman, was always concerned that reporters would misspell his name. During the Battle of Chickamauga, Steedman was a division commander in the Reserve Corps, which came to the timely aid of the Army of the Cumberland on the last day of the battle. At a crucial moment, his horse was shot from under him. Steedman mounted a borrowed horse to resume his desperate work. His aide, convinced that the general was going to get himself killed, asked if he had any last words. Steedman replied, "Yes. See that these damn newspaper reporters spell my name right."

Historian William Shanks, in his *Personal Recollections of Distinguished Generals*, wrote, "Steedman dares to assume responsibilities which are at times appalling and does so with so much cool impudence as silences you in astonishment, and such sublime nerve and boldness as hushes you in admiration. He defies arguement by the preposterousness of his plans, and silences opposition by the daring with which he executes them. He hesitates at nothing. The magnitude of an undertaking has a charm for him, and he accomplishes great things in the most unexpected of ways."

Jerry Allen is a retired pension actuary currently living in Cary, IL. He has been a lifelong amateur historian with a primary interest in the American Civil War. He is a past president of the Civil War Round Table of Chicago and the Northern Illinois Civil War Round Table. He is a member of seven Civil War Round Tables. For more than 25 years, he has been making presentations, including living history performances, to history groups. Jerry is a fine speaker and storyteller with a depth of knowledge and a twinkle in his eye.

## Camp Douglas and Chicago during the Civil War

Chicago has numerous connections to the Civil War, but too often, they go unnoticed. The **Elk Grove Historical Museum** is providing visitors with the opportunity to look more closely at some of those connections. Perhaps the most tangible link to the war was the presence of Camp Douglas. The camp served as both a training camp for Union soldiers recruited from northeastern Illinois and as a prisoner of war camp during its existence. With items generously on loan from the Camp Douglas Restoration Foundation and the personal collection of Civil War historian Robert I. Girardi, this exhibition will provide visitors with a window to the City of Chicago during the Civil War, the experiences of prisoners at Camp Douglas, and the postwar use of Libby Prison as a museum. This exhibition will be on display until December 19. The Elk Grove Historical Museum is open Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays 12-4pm. The museum is located at 399 Biesterfield Road, Elk Grove Village.

# <u>September 2025 Preservation Report by Brian Conroy</u>

## Save 74 Acres of Hallowed Ground in Virginia & Arkansas

Today, you have a unique opportunity to protect 74 irreplaceable acres at three different battlefields where Americans fought and fell in the name of freedom. These landscapes are not just land — they are living history. And if we don't act now, they could be lost forever to development. # Pea Ridge, Arkansas

This is a historic first: the American Battlefield Trust has not previously preserved land at Pea Ridge. These 3 acres adjoin the Pea Ridge National Military Park, where the pivotal Civil War battle unfolded on March 7–8, 1862. It was a fight that helped Union forces maintain control of Missouri — and now, encroaching development in the area threatens to erase its story from the land. These acres are unprotected, and without our help, they cannot be acquired and eventually restored to their 1862 appearance.

# Deep Bottom, Virginia

Just 600 feet from surviving Civil War fortifications lie two tracts totaling nearly 6 acres — potential targets for development. At this site in August 1864, Union brigades stormed the defenses and were met with a brutal Confederate counterattack. The land saw waves of charging troops, retreat, and relentless fire. These important tracts in the epicenter of the battlefield are two of the few remaining to be preserved at this hallowed site — and they are in immediate jeopardy. #### Saltville, Virginia

This 65-acre tract in southwestern Virginia preserves the site of not one, but two crucial Civil War battles, including the October 2, 1864 assault by the 5th U.S. Colored Cavalry. Fighting up a steep mountainside under a hail of Confederate fire, these brave men overcame incredible odds. Col. James S. Brisbin called their charge a "desperate struggle" that broke through enemy lines. Their valor deserves to be remembered — and preserved.
